Mayor Shares Festive Spirit

As the holiday season begins, Buloke Shire's Mayor Alan Getley, encourages everyone to embrace the spirit of kindness and giving, reflecting on the joy of community connection.

"Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year! This is a time to celebrate generosity, compassion, and the strength of our local connections," said the Mayor.

"Let's share the festive cheer and continue supporting one another."

The newly elected Buloke Shire Council's first Ordinary Meeting addressed key areas to strengthen governance, community well-being, and policy alignment.

It also awarded over \$7,000 to local community groups under the Council's Community Grants Program for projects ranging from repainting engine J524 in Donald Train Park to an event for senior high school students to

promote the best ways to live healthy lives.

Updates to the Expenses Policy now include improved approval processes for memberships, professional development, and travel, alongside enhanced administrative support for Councillors.

Significant updates were also made to the Governance Rules and Election Period Policy, introducing a dedicated "Governance" section to the Order of Business and streamlining public participation through written questions submitted two days before meetings.

Council reaffirmed its commitment to child safety by adopting the Child Safe Standards Policy, requiring

adherence to strict standards to prevent harm and align with legislative requirements.

Council welcomed Stephen Gardner as the new Independent Member of the Audit and Risk Committee, highlighting its ongoing focus on financial reporting, risk management, and disaster recovery improvements.

The next Council meeting will be held in the Wycheeproof Supper Room on Wednesday, February 19, at 7:00 p.m..

Declan Graduates


Former Donald High School student, Declan O'Shea, the school's dux of 2011, graduated from Melbourne University on Tuesday, December 17, after successfully completing a PHD thesis which included research that looked at how to improve estimates of extreme flood risk.

One of 56 doctorates presented on the day, Dr. O'Shea, a senior hydrologist who is currently employed by Melbourne based company Hydrology and Risk Consulting, was described as having developed novel statistical methods and modelling approaches to improve the estimation of flood risks.

This work represents a profound contribution to

understanding of how floods vary with catchment wetness and rainfall extremes, and how the risk of flooding is impacted by climate change.

Declan's parents, Raeanne and Shane O'Shea, attended the presentation, ceremony conducted at the Melbourne Exhibition Building.



Capri Joins Jonny's Journey

When soldiers put their lives on the front line, long-term health challenges are almost inevitable, but assistance dogs are improving both the physical and mental wellbeing of those in need.

Birchip resident Mr Jonathan (Jonny) Kemp has recently completed training with Integra Service Dogs Australia, becoming the custodian of an Integra-

owned assistance dog named Capri.

Overcoming Trauma

Jonny's journey began with rigorous training as an Australian soldier, a

demanding yet rewarding experience that took him to the Kapooka Military Area in New South Wales.

Tragically, just as he completed his training and was leaving Kapooka, Jonny was struck by a stolen car driven by two fifteen-year-old boys in a hit-and-run incident. The collision left Jonny with shattered legs, a brain injury, and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

At just 19 years old, Jonny was confined to a wheelchair for 18 months and was unable to actively serve, despite having signed up for a six-year term as a qualified Private Soldier.

Since then, Jonny has endured over 40 admissions to the Department of Veterans' repatriation hospital at Austin Health for PTSD, depression, anxiety, service-related injuries, and suicide attempts.

Integra

Austin Health introduced Jonny to the Psychiatric Assistance Program, which provided critical support to help manage his health challenges.

"The program is awesome, it is stopping veterans from suicide," Jonny said.

Through the program, Jonny was connected with Integra Service Dogs Australia, which provides highly trained

assistance dogs to veterans and first responders.

Capri, a labrador-retriever, underwent 18 months of specialised training at a cost of over \$70,000 to prepare him for his vital role.

"In just two weeks, Capri has given me companionship, love, and support," Jonny said.

"She is always watching me and by my side, responding to every situation."

Integra covers veterinary costs, insurance, and other associated expenses, while also helping clients learn how to manage these costs as they

take on the responsibility of their assistance dogs.

Training

Jonny undertook an intensive four-day training course with Capri at the beginning of their journey together.

Under the professional support of Integra, Jonny successfully completed his Queensland Guide Hearing and Assistance Dog (GHAD) Public Access Test (PAT) assessment.

Jonny was issued with a GHAD Primary Handler Identity Card, allowing him and his labrador-retriever to work on-lead in busy complex public settings, offices, hospitals, public transport and in official, retail and commercial settings.

Capri is trained to be calm and focused in public,

dedicated to supporting Jonny without being disruptive.

At Birchip

Birchip residents will soon become accustomed to seeing Jonny and Capri out and about. Whether visiting public spaces or local businesses, the pair, with Capri proudly wearing her Integra jacket, are a testament to the life-changing impact of assistance dogs.

Integra Service Dogs Australia is a not-for-profit organisation providing invaluable support to first responders and Australian Defence Force personnel. Thanks to their efforts and the loyalty of dogs like Capri, veterans like Jonny are finding renewed hope and strength to face life's challenges.

Coal Mine Expansions “Fly in Face of Science”

The Federal Government’s approval of four coal mine expansions locks in decades of climate pollution and flies in the face of science, says the Climate Council.

Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek has justified the mine approvals because they will mostly produce coal for steelmaking, with some thermal coal also produced for burning in power stations.

Climate Councillor Professor Lesley Hughes said: “Our atmosphere doesn’t care if this coal is for steel or power – it’s all heating our planet and driving climate pollution. Burning coal fuels the climate

crisis, worsening bushfires, floods and heatwaves that devastate our communities. This decision flies in the face of science, common sense, global responsibility and our duty to protect our kids’ future.”

The International Energy Agency (IEA) has made it clear: new or expanded coal mines are incompatible with limiting global warming to 1.5°C. Even for steelmaking, existing coal supplies are capable of meeting demand through to 2050.

BIGGEST THREAT

This decision is a clear example of how Australia’s broken environment laws fail to protect the environment from its biggest threat: climate change. Currently, they don’t require projects to account for their climate pollution, allowing coal and gas giants to

open more polluting projects without accountability. Addressing this blind spot by strengthening our environmental laws could stop this, but the Albanese government seems to have all but given up on these critical reforms.


“Approving these mines while delaying stronger protections shows a clear disconnect between the government’s rhetoric and its actions. It’s past time to make

cuts to climate pollution central to every decision we make,” Professor Hughes said.



Take Care as Temperatures Soar

The State Government is reminding Victorians to take care of themselves and others as one of the hottest days this year approaches and heat blankets most of the state.

Minister for Health Mary Anne Thomas warns Victorians to be prepared for the scorching days ahead, with temperatures expected to hit 40-degrees or higher in many parts of the state on Thursday.

Extreme heat kills more people than natural disasters, but there are simple steps people can take to beat the heat:

- Drink plenty of water, stay cool by seeking out air-conditioned buildings.

- Plan ahead and schedule activities to the coolest part of the day.

- If heading outdoors, seek shade when possible, wear a hat and sunscreen and avoid exercising in the heat.

- Check in on others most at risk in the heat.

People who are vulnerable to extreme heat include the elderly, babies and infants, pregnant women, people with

acute or chronic health problems and people who are socially isolated. These conditions can lead to heat exhaustion and heatstroke, trigger heart attacks or stroke, or worsen existing conditions such as kidney or lung disease.

Children and pets are particularly vulnerable to heat if left in enclosed areas like parked cars, where temperatures can more than double within minutes, and which are often 20 to 30 degrees hotter than outside – a deadly combination for children, whose body temperatures rise much faster than adults.

Ambulance Victoria data shows paramedics made 117 callouts to people in locked cars in November with the total reports in the past year surpassing 1,210 – almost 90 per cent of cases involving

children under 13, with 12.3 p.m. the busiest time for call outs.

Leaving the windows of a parked car down has little effect on reducing the temperature, with tests showing that when windows are left open 10 centimetres, the temperature will only reduce by five degrees.

Salvos Remember Cyclone Tracy

This December marks the 50th anniversary of Cyclone Tracy; one of the most destructive natural disasters ever recorded in Australian history.

The Salvation Army was on the ground in Darwin and at relief centres across Australia to help those who fled the devastation, providing more than 25,000 meals in the first four days and supporting over 36,000 people who were affected by the disaster.

Captains Alan and Margaret Walker, and Captains Hilton and Wilga Morris were The Salvation Army Officers in Darwin at the time. Despite facing their own loss and trauma, they jumped into action with their fellow Salvos team to provide crisis relief on Christmas Day and in the weeks and months ahead.

Today, The Salvos remember the 66 lives lost, the 145 individuals who were seriously injured and the tens of thousands who were directly affected by the disaster which saw 80 per cent of Darwin wiped out in the early hours of Christmas Day, 1974.

Memories of the disaster remain vivid 50 years on. The Salvation Army's current Chief Secretary, Colonel Winsome Merrett, is the daughter of Captains Hilton and Wilga Morris. She remembers sheltering in the kitchen and being evacuated on a crowded plane to Brisbane. After the disaster, she returned to Darwin to complete Year 12 at the only secondary school that was left standing.

Former Commissioner of The Salvation Army Australia, James Condon, was the leader of the Mt Isa Salvos, an evacuation centre for people from Darwin. James has clear memories of the devastation and the emergency relief provided to people who needed shelter, food and clothing.

As was noted at the time, "Santa never made it into Darwin that year, but the Salvos did, and they made their presence felt. Throughout the Cyclone Tracy disaster, The Salvation Army:

- Supported 36,000 people who had to be clothed, fed and evacuated from Darwin;
- Served more than 25,000 meals at Darwin Airport within four days of the cyclone hitting town;
- Opened centres in most capital cities across Australia to receive donated goods and store supplies, then trucked or flown to Darwin

• Met evacuees at the other end of their flight, boarding planes to comfort people who were distressed and traumatised;

• Raised over \$1 million through their National Appeal in the first few days, which was used to support those affected by Cyclone Tracy.

The Salvation Army was privileged to provide support

Flaxleaf Fleabane

Fleabane research will be a focus at BCG's Trial's Review Day on Friday, February 21 at the Birchip Community Leisure Centre.

BCG Research Agronomist Angus Butterfield will detail why the key to controlling mature flaxleaf fleabane (*Conyza spp.*) is in the first pass of a double-knock strategy.

Butterfield undertook two trials researching the stubborn weed near Birchip, Victoria in the summer of 2023-24, focussing on double-knock control. The first trial focussed on the effectiveness of different first pass options and the second trial, second pass treatments.

Growers may find the results surprising. "What we found," Butterfield explains, "is that first spray applications are critical for effective control of mature flaxleaf fleabane and premium herbicide products often deliver better results in the first spray".

The wind-borne surface germinating weed has become prolific since the adoption of no till farming systems. Each plant can produce up to

110,000 seeds (Wu 2012) and its waxy surface gives it a natural tolerance to glyphosate (Daniel 2015).

"What makes it particularly tricky to control is that fleabane often comes up in spring under crops and therefore options for its control while it is still small and easier to kill are limited," Butterfield says. "Our trial work highlights that the addition of Dropzone® to a standard summer spray significantly improves control of flaxleaf fleabane, while common mixes such as 2,4-D ester and triclopyr offer no additional control over a standard glyphosate mix."

Another interesting finding of the trials was that glyphosate and Terrad'or® may not be needed to control flaxleaf fleabane and excluding these products could significantly reduce costs.

Robotic Weed Manager Pays its

Weed detection and spot spraying in fallow is a powerful way to reduce chemical use, conserve soil moisture and run down the weed seed bank.

Andrew and Cynthia Pursehouse and their eldest son James recently 'employed' a Swarmbot named 'Mooki', fitted with a 13 m RBE boom and Weed-IT Quadro sensors as their dedicated fallow spot-spraying unit on their 5100-ha mixed farming operation, 'Breeza Station', on the Liverpool Plains, NSW.

In 2015, they began optical spot spraying using a 36 m Weedseeker boom on their Miller Nitro SP to reduce their chemical use in fallow fields.

Spot spraying fallow weeds, including milk thistle, fleabane, ryegrass, windmill grass, and barnyard grass, uses much less chemical per spray pass than blanket spraying, representing significant savings to their business.

James said that although the 36 m Weedseeker boom worked well, they frequently needed their self-propelled machine to do two jobs simultaneously. The family investigated their options and weighed the pros and cons of buying a second self-propelled sprayer or an autonomous (robot) to increase their spray capacity.

"While both are expensive pieces of machinery, we saw the benefit of the robotic option as the ability to do two spray jobs simultaneously without needing to employ an extra operator," he said.

In 2022, they ordered a robotic platform from Swarm-Farm as a dedicated fallow weed spot-spraying unit, and it was deployed on Breeza Station in June 2023.

"In the 14 months between June 2023 and August 2024, the Swarmbot completed 1490 engine hours, which includes time travelling, spraying and in sleep mode," said James. "It has an average operating speed of 9.7 ha/hr, uses 0.8 L/ha of diesel, and has a running cost of \$4/ha."

In comparison, their SP sprayer typically covers 50 ha/hr and uses 0.9 L/ha of diesel when camera spraying, giving a similar running cost per ha. It also requires a driver.

James said they have made a major shift from reactive to proactive weed management, where they are now targeting smaller weeds more often using a spray rotation of three to four weeks, according to weather conditions.

"All weeds are more susceptible to herbicide when they are small," he said. "The robot removes the normal temptation to hold off spraying to wait for a few more weeds to emerge."

"The fact that the robot will return to each paddock within a few weeks means that we are continually driving down the weed seed bank by eliminating small weeds before they can establish and set seed."

The Purshouses have implemented many of the WeedSmart Big 6 tactics to reduce their risk of herbicide resistance, including increasing their spray efficacy with the robot providing a consistent 50 cm boom height and slower operating speed so the Weed-IT sensors can detect very small weeds in heavy stubble.

To comply with their controlled traffic system, 'Mooki' has 4 m centres and a 13 m RBE spray boom. This is standard for 12 m CTF systems to provide a 0.5 m overlap for each pass. The platform carries a 1500 L

spray tank and weighs about 5t when fully loaded.

"The Nitro SP weighs about 20 t when fully loaded, so the robot has a distinct advantage when it comes to minimising compaction and getting onto paddocks sooner after rain," said James. "We selected 1400 mm high-clearance chassis so we didn't lock ourselves out of future use opportunities such as inter-row spraying in skip-row cotton crops."

Since adding Mooki to the farm workforce, the self-propelled sprayer's engine hours have been reduced, extending its effective life. Staff time and skills have also been better utilised.

"At cotton picking time, the whole team can focus on picking and mulching jobs knowing that Mooki is attending to the fallow spraying," said James. "This means all jobs are being done on time, and we don't have to worry about the fallow weeds depleting our stored soil moisture or setting seed. And none of us wish we were out spot spraying!"

Resources for Ewe Pregnancy Scanning

Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) and Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) have released a range of new resources to help producers scan and manage pregnant ewes.

The new resources are the result of a multi-year co-investment between MLA and AWI aimed to improve lamb survival and reproductive rates in the Australian sheep flock through better adoption of pregnancy scanning. The background research was completed by The University of Adelaide and included many industry consultants in the project team.

In 2018, an MLA-funded survey of Australian sheep producers determined that 69% of respondents did not pregnancy scan their ewe flocks for litter size.

According to Project Manager for Sheep and Goat Productivity at MLA, Dr Daniel Forwood, this limits a producer's capacity to maximise lamb and ewe survival.

"Pregnancy scanning is a vital tool for improving sheep

reproductive performance. It enables identification of litter size early in pregnancy, so that multiple-bearing ewes can be differentially managed to meet recommended condition score targets and increase survival," Dr Forwood said.

"Research shows pregnancy scanning in sheep provides an average increase in profit of \$5.55/ewe scanned.

"By customising ewe nutrition during pregnancy and lactation according to whether ewes are carrying singles or multiples, producers can help to reduce lamb and ewe mortality."

As part of the project, AWI General Manager for Research, Bridget Peachey, said that AWI and MLA conducted an extensive benefit cost analysis on the value of scanning across a range of sheep producing regions and enterprise types.

"In addition, the two organisations undertook a series of grower interviews and surveys to create a better understanding of the barriers to adoption of pregnancy scanning, then develop solutions to overcome these barriers," Ms Peachey said.

"Important to increasing producer adoption is having a detailed business case for pregnancy scanning which is applicable to different production environments and enterprise types, producer needs and resource availability."

The resources released include the value of pregnancy scanning; ewe scanning and management checklist; pregnancy scanning: an ultrasound investment; resource guide for sheep reproduction; the value of pregnancy scanning: a benefit-cost analysis.

This project is an initiative under the Sheep Reproduction Strategic Partnership (SRSP). The SRSP is a sheep industry initiative managed by MLA that seeks to profitably and sustainably increase lamb production by increasing weaning rates and decreasing mortality.

The SRSP Management Committee oversees the direction of the partnership. Its membership is composed of the Southern Australia Livestock Research Council (SALRC) and Western Australian Livestock Research Council (WALRC) chairs and producer members, Sheep Producers Australia (SPA), AWI, and MLA's Sheep and goat Productivity and Consultation programs.





New Careers for Graduate Paramedics

Ambulance Victoria (AV) has recruited 61 graduate paramedics who will start the new year with a new career, saving lives across Victoria.

Interim Chief Executive Officer Andrew Crisp and Minister for Health and Ambulance Services Mary-Anne Thomas welcomed a group of new recruits as they get ready to join paramedic crews in 2025.

"Our paramedics, volunteers and support staff are our greatest assets," Mr Crisp said.

"It is through them that AV continues to lead the way in patient care, including one of the best cardiac arrest survival rates in the world."

"We now have more than 5,000 on-road paramedics delivering the very best lifesaving care, everywhere, and it's great to see more joining our ranks across Melbourne and regional Victoria."

On December 9, 2024, the latest intake of 40 new graduate paramedics started their careers at AV with a four-week operational induction program.

The intake is made up of 30 graduate paramedics who will work on Medium Acuity Transport Service (MATS) teams across metropolitan Melbourne and 10 graduate paramedics going to regional ambulance branches in Hamilton, Ballarat, Sebastopol, Yarrawonga, Benalla, Wangaratta, Wodonga, Echuca and Mildura.

The group also includes four Ambulance Community Officers (ACOs) who, through the GAP program, will become qualified paramedics and continue to provide care to communities in regional Victoria.

They will all hit the road on Monday, January 6, 2025. On the same day, another intake of 21 graduate paramedics will begin induction and hit the road on Monday February 3, 2025.

The recruits all undertake a comprehensive operational induction program giving them the "real world" skills

they need to hit the road with experienced paramedics.

Mr Crisp said since the introduction of Australia's first ambulance officers training course in 1961, Victoria has remained a leader in paramedic education.

"In Victoria, we are proud to have some of the most highly trained and skilled paramedics in Australia," Mr Crisp said.

"During their induction, our new recruits learn vital skills such as safely moving and loading patients to prevent injuries, aggression and assault prevention, and safely driving ambulance vehicles.

"Over the course of their program, graduate paramedics work to become qualified paramedics. They initially work under the direct supervision of clinical instructors to assist with the transition from the classroom to their role as paramedics.

"However, training continues throughout their entire careers to ensure patients receive the very best, and most up-to-date life-saving care – and paramedics stay safe while they are doing so.

"Like all our hardworking paramedics, these new recruits have chosen this path because they are compassionate and courageous and want to make a difference to the community."

"It takes a special kind of person to do that, and I wish them all long and rewarding careers at AV."

AV has undertaken record recruitment in recent years, with a 53 per cent increase in on-road clinical staff over the past decade. In 2023-24, 258 paramedic employees were recruited by AV.




Rob barely had time to undress and jump back into bed before he heard the familiar knock on the door. "Time to get up Rob. I'll go ahead and get things started".
