Unbreakable Wheel Rolls Out Across Buloke

Following his successful Paddock Run tour across Buloke Shire last year, Warren Davies – known as the Unbreakable Farmer – has re-launched his Unbreakable Wheel of Wellbeing in Wycheeproof.

The Unbreakable Wheel, introduced to farmers and community members via the Paddock Run in Birchip, Berriwillock, Charlton, Donald, Nandaly, Wycheeproof and Yeungroon, is now featured on posters and drink coasters distributed to local pubs and clubs across Buloke Shire.

Self-Assessment

It is a simple self-assessment tool created to help people reflect on key areas of their wellbeing including mental, social, financial, environmental, and vocational health as well as community belonging and relationships.

Re-launched in Wycheeproof on Tuesday at the Wycheeproof Royal Mail Hotel, the Unbreakable Wheel of Wellbeing encourages individuals to rate them-

selves from 1-5 to identify areas that need attention, serving as a starting point for support and self-reflection.

"This is a very important intervention as it helps keeps conversations going in familiar spaces, encouraging people to check in on themselves and others," said Terry Mathieson, proprietor Wycheeproof Royal Mail Hotel.

Difficult Emotions

"Right now, some conversations in the community are retriggering difficult emotions and creating tension. This initiative provides safe, familiar spaces to normalise mental health discussions and support wellbeing in a more constructive way."

With conversation starters right at the bar, this initiative keeps mental health in focus, helping to foster stronger,

more resilient rural communities.

"This is about breaking down barriers and creating comfortable spaces where people can say, 'I'm not doing so well'—and know they're not alone," said Warren Davies.

critical minerals producer Energy Fuels, to develop the Donald Project in the Wimmera, about 300 kms north-west of Melbourne.

Discovered in the 1980s, the site about 15 kms north-east of Minyip, represents one of the world's largest known mineral sands deposits. It contains titanium, zircon, and rare earth elements essential for ceramics, electric vehicles, renewable energy technologies, and high-tech applications.

The project has a 42-year lifespan and will create more than 500 jobs, boost economic growth, and strengthen Australia's position in the global critical minerals supply chain.

After 20 years of development and more than \$100 million investment in engineering, design, land, water acquisition and environmental studies, the project is pending Victorian Government work plan approval.

Skills Training Critical to Closing National Employment Gap

Kinder Welcomes Young Learners

Birchip Kindergarten has officially commenced for the year, welcoming twenty-six children into their three- and four-year-old programs, which provide fifteen hours of free kindergarten under the Victorian Government's Best Start, Best Life reforms.

The Birchip Kindergarten has eight enrolled in the four-year-old Pelican program and 18 in the three-year-old Penguin program, and all the children attend together on Wednesdays and Thursdays for 7.5 hours each day.

The programs led by the dedicated teaching team of Tracey Bennett, Emma Bennett, and Tammy Jans Ward focuses on play-based learning, social development, and school readiness, giving children a strong foundation for their future education.

Birchip has been at the forefront of the three-year-old

kindergarten program, transitioning to 15 hours per week and from 2026, Buloke will begin the transition of four-year-old kindergarten to Pre-Prep.

In 2026, four-year-old kindergarten will increase to 20 hours per week, gradually transitioning to 30 hours per week by 2031.

It is going to be interesting to see the impact of these reforms, as the government looks for ways to ensure that every child gets the best possible start in life.

Maintain Ground Cover to Protect Soils

Isolated dust storms recently are a reminder of how fragile some of our soils are.

They are also a good reminder there is still time to prevent this damage by de-stocking more vulnerable areas of the farm. While dust storms contain mostly mineral materials, they also contain significant quantities of organic matter, one of the most valuable components of our soils.

Wind Erosion

Leaving stock in a paddock for an extra couple of weeks to make use of remaining water supplies can be all

it takes to expose the paddock to the risk of wind erosion.

Dust storms or wind erosion occur when the speed of the wind at the soil surface exceeds the forces holding soil particles in place. Typically, soil particles exist as a small pea sized peds or aggregates.

As these peds or aggregates break down, the soil becomes more vulnerable to erosion.

Once the process of wind erosion starts it can be nearly impossible to stop, as the larger sand grains bounce and

roll across the soil surface stripping remaining vegetation and smashing (or sand blasting) the soil in front of them.

Most Vulnerable

The most vulnerable areas are those with lightly textured soils, little groundcover and shelter belts and topography that exposes them to high wind speeds. Lighter textured soils are those containing a high proportion of sand with little or no clay.

Wind erosion can start anywhere the soil has been disturbed, such as in gateways,

along tracks and around water troughs.

Ground Cover

The key to preventing wind erosion is to maintain as much ground cover as possible and avoiding disturbing the soil. Aim for 80% cover in pasture paddocks and 60% cover in crop stubbles. Ground cover also helps moderate temperature extremes in soil and retains moisture.

Maintaining good ground cover will reduce the risk of wind erosion, but will also reduce damage to pastures and assist with a faster recovery following the autumn break.

Bare soil is also more susceptible to oxidation and microbial activity that can release stored carbon as CO₂. Building the soil carbon levels back up can take years in drier climates. Soil carbon is a valuable soil resource as it improves soil structure, increases water retention and nutrient availability.

When groundcover levels are low, the only practical way to reduce the risk of wind erosion is to remove livestock to other paddocks or place stock in a stock containment area.

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
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

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
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Jeffcott House Defends Swimming Title – Again





Marion Will Be Missed

(Eulogy by Gary Weir)

Marion Bayles passed away on Tuesday, February 4, 2025. Her funeral was on Friday, February 7, 2025.

A daughter of the late Bob and Audry Davison, Marion was born at the Donald Bush Nursing Hospital on March 18, 1948. She was the elder sister to Beth Weir and the late Robert Davison and the siblings grew up on the farm "Walkato", at North Laen.

Marion received her formal education at Litchfield Primary and Donald High School. In 1956, the big wet saw roads out at North Laen impassable by cars or trucks. "Rolly" the resident horse was put to use, harnessed up to gig and driven to and from school by Marion.

After completing her education, she commenced employment at Les Pearce's garage, pumping petrol and some book work, then moved to the Shire of Donald under Mr Smale and Kath O'Connell, then later under Tom Bowles and Kath O'Connell.

Marion was married in 1972, but sadly widowed after 12 months. She married again in 1974 to husband Brian and together they raised a family of 4; Sarah, Rebecca, Joanne, and Andrew.

Family Day Care

During her marriage to Brian, Marion became involved in family day care, where over a number of years, she cared for over 100

pre-schoolers in her home; a time she loved very much.

Her next endeavour was as a carer at the J.G. Homes where "activities" was her favourite role. She adopted many characters in her quest to entertain residents – she was the Queen on the Queen's birthday, the Easter Bunny at Easter and various other roles.

On one occasion, she took a bus load of residents for a drive.

"A wonderful trip", the residents said. "Where did you go?" They were asked.

"To the top of Mount Jeffcott", was the reply. Marion then found out that she was not supposed to take the community bus off the bitumen. That, of course, was Marion.

She was involved with the Donald Uniting Church, being an Elder, Congregation Secretary and even the cleaner at one stage, and was a regular attender until recently.

Hockey

Hockey played a major role in Marion's life. She was a foundation member of the Donald Hockey Club and played in numerous premiership teams. She had the pleasure of playing with her three daughters and sister Beth against Andrew and was awarded life membership, twice! She became one of the

instigators of "Vic Gold", a team drawn from country Victoria which competed in Masters Games. She played in Melbourne, Canberra, Adelaide, Sydney and Geelong, winning a swag of gold medals.

P.F.A. was big in Marion's younger days. She and friend Ruth Feeny produced a "scandal sheet" under the name "Zippy and Cassius". "Zippy" because Ruth had a dress with a zipper right down the front and "Cassius" because Marion could flatten anyone who disagreed with them.

Marion was one of the organisers of the "Pink Ribbon" morning teas, which had raised about \$10,000 for the Cancer Council during her time of involvement. She was also a regular blood donor, not quite reaching 100 donations due to her medication change.

Marion was an avid reader with a passageway full of bookcases, which were always full, arranged in authors in alphabetical order. She exchanged letters and cards with a pen friend in Nova Scotia, Canada, for many years; a card arriving just last week.

Girl Guides

Another interest was Guiding. Marion started as a Girl Guide, then became a Guide leader for years with Pamela Barber, and obtained her Queen's Guide Award.

Sewing was another hobby. Sewing clothes for the family, patchworking, making "throw overs" and even Deb dresses, such was her skill with a sewing machine.


At home, gardening took up any spare time she had and she also had a great love of her pets. Many may have heard her talking about beagle "Boots" in the later years.

For Bushfire Affected Victorians . . . More Support Needed

The Grampians – Wallaby Rocks and Little Desert bushfires, which ignited on December 17, 2024 and intensified on January 27, 2025, have now been contained thanks to extensive fire-fighting efforts.

While conditions remain challenging, the focus is shifting from emergency response to emergency recovery, but farmers and small businesses in the region are still waiting to hear if assistance will be forthcoming.

Shadow Emergency Management Minister, Perin Davey, has called on the Victorian and Federal Government to fast-track assessment to expand Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) for small business and primary producers.

"Western Victoria has endured immense challenges, with continued uncertainty and financial hardship.

"Immediate support for councils and evacuation centres have been rolled out, but the expanded support for farmers and tourism operators is waiting on State Government assessment.

"In Australia at the moment, we are seeing the tale of two disasters with businesses in far north Queensland eligible for Disaster Assistance Loans, while businesses in western Victoria are still waiting," Senator Davey said.

The fires burnt over 230,000 hectares across the regions, causing significant damage, including the loss of several homes, outbuildings, livestock, and wildlife, with lasting impacts on local agriculture and tourism.

"It is vital that both state and federal governments act quickly to restore confidence and support these devastated communities," said Senator Davey.

Impact

Member for Mallee, Dr Anne Webster MP, has been raising concerns about the crippling financial impact on tourism-dependent communities.

"The impact of these fires on Mallee communities is devastating, not just in terms of property loss but also the long-term damage to local economies.

Halls Gap alone has lost an estimated \$21 million in tourism revenue, with the region conservatively estimated to suffer a further \$19 million hit in flow-on costs.

"While some other disaster affected areas of the country have already received critical disaster assistance, local Mallee communities are still waiting due to Government inaction. The Victorian and Federal Government must fast-track support for our farmers and tourism operators before it's too late." Dr Webster said.

Early Intervention Support... MASP Welcomes Federal Funding

Mallee Accommodation and Support Program (MASP) welcomes the Australian Government's additional funding for three early intervention support services for men, including those who perpetrate or experience family and domestic violence.

Under the funding, "No to Violence" will receive an additional \$1.89 million from 2024-25 to 2025-26 for the Men's Referral Service and the Brief Intervention Service, and Lifeline Australia will receive an additional \$800,000 in 2024-25 for MensLine Australia.

MASP Acting CEO Charmaine Calis said early intervention in family violence plays a key role in preventing men from escalating their behaviour.

"Prevention is always better than cure, which is why it is good to see these national programs receive more fund-

ing in order to protect victim-survivors from immediate and long-term harm," she said.

"MASP staff see the impacts of family and domestic violence every day and the significant impact this has on those within our communities. Everybody has the right to feel safe and secure and we


want to see a world where this is the case."

To Improve Fish Habitat... Catch A Grant

Victoria's world-class marine, estuarine and freshwater fisheries will continue to flourish into the future with more fish habitat thanks to the second round of a \$2.5 million grants program.

Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) CEO Travis Dowling said the Victorian Government's \$96m investment to improve fishing, boating, piers and aquaculture was backing round two of the Fish Habitat Improvement Fund, which enables the installation of habitat so fish can rest, feed and breed as well as boosting the health of aquatic ecosystems.

"We know improving fish habitat makes a real difference to our fisheries and aquatic ecosystems long-term and we encourage eligible groups and organisations to apply for a grant," he said.

The grants are available through two funding streams – one open year-round to projects from recreational fishing groups for up to \$50,000, and funding for larger scale projects for up to \$200,000 where co-investment is required.

It continues a proud history of fish habitat projects like the installation of kingfish reefs in Port Phillip, shellfish reef restoration, and rocky reef modules in Corio Bay.

Partnership

Among the projects funded through round one of the grants program was a partner-

ship with the Australian Trout Foundation to invest \$49,000 into in-stream and streamside habitat in the Ovens River near Bright, complementing previous habitat improvement above and below this stretch of river.

In Port Phillip, the Albert Park Yachting and Angling Club led a large-scale project to build Kayakers Reef, a structure that will provide homes for shellfish and structure for popular recreational species like snapper, King George whiting and calamari.

More Structures

The \$200,000 project will deploy more structures into the water once they are seeded with native oysters, helping to restore lost shellfish reefs once abundant in Port Phillip. The triangle and tower structures are easily accessible for kayak and small

boat fishers wetting a line in our iconic bay, which has been net-free since 2022.

In a further boost to the environment, many habitat projects make use of recycled or re-used materials, such as oyster and mussel shells from restaurants and timber salvaged from storm damage or roadworks.

Organisations eligible to apply for the grants include catchment management authorities, local, regional and statewide fishing bodies, councils, water authorities, traditional owner groups and land councils and community organisations.

Applications for both funding streams are open now, with the larger-scale stream two grants closing on Friday, May 2. For more information, head to www.vfa.vic.gov.au/fishhabitatfund
