"OK"! What a Weekend!

As the adrenaline rush from "OK Motels" subsides, Charlton can reflect on how the modest little festival, which began back in 2018, has now grown into a full-on, "all-of-town" experience as 800 visitors descended on the "Friendly River Town" to make last weekend's event one for the record books.

While financial benefits aren't the only uptick from an event this size, the original concept – masterminded by photographer Kate Berry as a way of injecting life into retro motels in out-of-the-way places – "OK" has evolved into something of significance for Charlton.

Apart from bringing normally unobtainable indie and

rock bands to the area, the gradual integration of community involvement in the weekend has made for a groundswell of rapport between visitors and locals alike.

Rapturous Welcome

And it was a rapturous welcome which greeted fans, first-timers and returnees to this year's gathering with friendships being rekindled

and newbies settling into the leisurely country vibe.

For community organisations it can be a bonanza of a weekend. Despite the hard work (CWA members were up baking scones at 7 a.m. last Saturday), and the juggling of volunteers to support the various activities around town, the economic windfalls are a lifeblood for the community.

Ultimate Beneficiary

The Charlton A. & P. Society, along with other groups involved, say that the community is the ultimate beneficiary. The Show team covers the catering for the Saturday night dinner at the Charlton Hall, and secretary Wendy Laffin said, "This is a great fundraiser for us and means that we are able to channel money back into improving the Show."

Serving 350 meals on the night, the committee was assisted by the Charlton College Year 10 work experience students, who also

undertook their own fundraising by supplying breakfasts at the Traveller's Rest Saturday morning.

Charlton Lions Club were also extremely happy, with a reported takings of around \$3,800 (a combined total from the Sunday breakfast, raffle and site fees for the All of Town Garage Sale), along with the Charlton Op Shop which did "extremely well" according to Manager Gill Gretgrix.

Record Breaker

The East Charlton Hotel "broke all records" for the number of meals served over

the weekend, while Tia Fanning at "Caffeinated Chaos" tallied up a record breaking 322 coffees on Saturday, along with a clean sweep of food.

Meanwhile Cabbaritta CWA Branch members faced an unending line of patrons at the Bowls Club rooms for Saturday's morning tea where most of their 800 scones were eagerly consumed. Branch President, Maria Perger said it had been "crazy" since 10 a.m. with the group's craft stall having been cleared of items in a flash.

Speaker Takes Parliament to the Mallee

This week, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Honourable Milton Dick, MP, celebrated visiting 150 schools as part of the Parliament in Schools program, as he visited schools across Mallee with the Federal Member for Mallee, Dr Anne Webster, MP.

Students learned about federation, democracy and the Australian Parliament, as well as hearing first-hand from the Speaker and their local member on what a typical day looks like in their electorate and when they are in Parliament House for sitting weeks.

On Monday, February 24, they visited Holy Trinity

Lutheran College, Horsham; Birchip P-12 School, Birchip; and Robinvale College, Robinvale.

On Tuesday, February 25, they visited Irymple South Primary School, Irymple; and Henderson College, Irymple.

"I am so proud to be celebrating 150 school visits since I launched this program in 2022, bringing

Parliament to schools across Australia – from King Island to Far North Queensland to Nullagine, and now to Mallee," said the Speaker.

"It is a particularly important time for civics education and engagement. We need to ensure we improve democracy literacy across the nation, and support needs to be

extended to students regardless of their location.

"These students are our future leaders, and it is important that we equip them with the information and tools they need, to go on to be active and engaged citizens."


About the Parliament in Schools Program

Central Hub

Cheering and applause greeted each new formation as the water babes seamlessly floated from one position to another. Following a final salute to the crowd patrons once again plunged back in for a refresh as the temperature continued to soar.

Marry Your Friend

Another crowd-pleaser was the “Marry Your Friend” ceremonies at the Charlton Hall organized by radio / TV personality Marieke Hardy and her friend Emilie Zoey Baker. While also “taking their vows” on the day, Marieke said the late afternoon time slot worked better this year and had brought more focus to the event. Ten

weddings (including couples and throuples) and the inclusion of hair and make-up artists to add a little “sparkle” to the scene made for a very successful outcome. There was also tons of confetti!

“It was quite emotional” said Marieke, “and yes, there were tears! Participants had more time to prepare their vows and the audience could hear what was being expressed without the competition from people eating over dinner, as happened last year.” Op shop treasures also made for some glamourous outfits!

Evening Focus

As evening progressed the Charlton Motel became the focus with headline bands drawing the audience on into the night.

While this year’s event seemed to attract a younger crowd, patrons were respectful, friendly and were more than happy to be in a location where so many activities were available and within easy reach of each other.

Fire Services Levy Hike to Hurt Farmers

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) says proposed hikes to the proposed Fire Services Levy could see some farmers forced to pay up to 400% on top of the current levy.

VFF president, Brett Hosking said the levy flagged by the Victorian Government would place an enormous and unfair financial burden on those already struggling and farmers who are facing volatile prices, ever-decreasing profit margins and increasing extreme weather events.

"This tax hike is just another cost farm businesses will be forced to pay and it's time to go back to the drawing board and find a better solution," Mr Hosking said.

"A one-size-fits-all approach clearly doesn't work when you've got some farmers facing a hike of up to 400 per cent. There's no way a rise of that much can be justified and for some, it could

be the nail in the coffin for their farm businesses."

Mr Hosking added that while levies which fund our fire services are critical, the current broad-based tax is unfit for use and the Victorian Government must urgently consider an alternative.

"Instead of placing a blanket levy on all property owners, the government should consider a more targeted approach that ensures the funds are distributed where they're needed most," he said.

"Rural Victorians are already bearing the brunt of many challenges, from droughts to fires. This levy will add insult to injury, making it even harder for farmers to recover and thrive."

"The current approach certainly isn't a solution that supports the needs of country Victorians and we're urging the government to reassess its approach and explore more equitable solutions."

New Local Health Service Networks

[From the EWHS February 2025 Board Meeting]

The Victorian Government has announced 12 Local Health Service Networks. These have been designed following consultation and feedback from health services, and in response to the Government's plan to improve access, equity and care closer to home.

The Board acknowledged correspondence from the Minister for Health, placing EWHS within the Grampians Local Health Service Network.

This Network includes Beaufort & Skipton Health Service, Central Highlands Rural Health, East Grampians Health Service, East Wimmera Health Service, Grampians Health, Maryborough District Health Service, Rural Northwest Health, West Wimmera Health Service.

This grouping respects the natural flows of patients between local hospitals to the higher capability sites within the Grampians region such as Ballarat.

The Government acknowledged that EWHS also has distinct patient flows to Loddon Mallee Health Network including Bendigo. EWHS will work to ensure appropriate patient flows for local people.

At Donald

EWHS is pleased to be providing care to increasing numbers of Renal Dialysis patients through our service at Donald. The service is currently providing regular care close to home for six people.

EWHS is projecting to finish the financial year with a break-even operating result.

EWHS is fully accredited for Aged Care services, and

we are currently ensuring that our care is aligned with the new Aged Care standards that commence on July 1, 2025.

EWHS is preparing to develop a new Strategic Plan 2025-2029 and will soon be seeking community consultation.

The Board recognised ongoing environmental management initiatives across the health service, including continued investment in solar power and battery recycling.



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A Swim in Support of Buleke's Pools

The Nationals' Member for Mildura, Jade Benham, recently completed a swim in every community pool within the Buleke Shire, which aimed to highlight the importance of retaining these important community assets.

These pools, built following the 1956 Melbourne Olympics, are a cornerstone of our communities and are a place for social connection, recreation, and celebration. However, declining populations and rising maintenance costs have placed their future in jeopardy.

Royal Life Saving research indicates that 68% of community swimming pools are aged over 50 years, with 40% set to reach the end of their functional lifespan by 2030.

"These magnificent pools are more than just places to swim – they are woven into the fabric of our communities. Losing them would be devastating, particularly if they are not replaced," Ms Benham said.

"I've spent countless hours swimming in these pools, and I know firsthand how important they are to local residents. Our rural communities are already battling to keep people here, and removing vital

social infrastructure like public pools would only make that challenge greater.

"By and large, residents support public pools and their maintenance and upkeep needs to be on the Government's agenda.

"Too often, governments tend to tell us what we need rather than actually listening to the people who live here. But locals know how vital these pools are – not just for recreation and social connection, but for water safety and lifesaving skills.

"I'm also a certified Aus Swim teacher, so not only do we need to highlight the importance of retaining our public swimming pools for recreation and social connection, but for many – particularly children and families – this is the only place they will ever be able to learn to swim. In Australia, I believe it is every person's right to learn to be able to swim."

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Important Sessions for Birchip: Headspace, Gym, Drug and Alcohol

The Mallee Sports Assembly in conjunction with the Birchip P-12 School continues with the Active Youth Program for the Year 9 students which is supported by VicHealth under the "Regional Sport Program".

The sessions that were conducted are as follows:

Bullying

Ex-Birchip P-12 School student, Emily Noonan, who facilitated the session that covered the subject of "Bullying," was welcomed. Emily works with Headspace of Swan Hill.

Bullying is quite common, especially in some school environments. Emily showed a power point on the role of Headspace before getting the students to do a variety of activities about getting to know their classmates better and where they want to be in their life in years to come.

Emily pointed out why some people choose to bully others, such as stress and trauma in their own lives; low self-esteem or experiencing past bullying; social and cultural "norms"; and social combat.

Whatever the reasons, bullying is non-acceptable, and Headspace is an organization that aims to reduce this behaviour through education programs.

Rhonda Allan of the Mallee Sports Assembly thanked Emily for her time

and support to the Active Youth Program for the Birchip P-12 School.

Gym Session

The students had a great work out with qualified fitness instructor Demi Foott. Demi kept everyone moving well and included some great work out options which is excellent to enhance your fitness for other sports like football, netball, hockey etc.

Demi's session involved 8 different exercises which included using the bench press, Renegade rowing, medicine ball, step ups, jumping and squats, bar bells etc. The focus was on strength and balance.

The students rotated around the different stations; some were outside under the shelter.

The drills were 45 seconds each, with a 15 second break before moving on to the next station. The session concluded with some cool down stretches.

Drug & Alcohol

This session was facilitated by Vic Police officer

Tania Peters (Swan Hill), School Nurse Jeanette Trembath (Horsham) and School Nurse Jacinta Miller (Wycheepoof).

Jeanette commenced the session with the question "What is a Drug?" The answer is: "Any substance that (when taken) changes a person's functionality and psychology".

Jeanette and Jacinta covered the "Health" aspect of using drugs (including alcohol) and good reasons for not using them as follows: Lack of control, health implications, cost, bad experiences, physical and mental health are some examples.

Tania spoke of the legality of using drugs and in particular alcohol and the laws associated with the consumption of it.

Other discussions included "Why do people use drugs and alcohol?" and how poor decision making could change one's life in a split second.

Raising Pension Age Lowers the Australian Birth Rate

Raising the pension age for women has reduced Australia's birth rate by delaying grandmothers' retirement and limiting their availability for child-care, new research by the e61 Institute has found.

Using data gathered from the Household, Income and Labour Dynamics in Australia (HILDA) Survey from 2001 to 2022, the study found that women whose mothers were not yet old enough for the pension were less likely to have children, with the likelihood decreasing from 73.5% to 69%.

Fewer Children

Those women also had fewer children on average at 1.47 compared to 1.56 for women whose mothers had qualified for the pension.

Between 1995 and 2023, the pension age for women gradually increased from 60 to 67, delaying grandmothers' retirement. The employment

rate among grandmothers eligible for the pension is 25% compared to 36% for those who are not, and eligible grandmothers work 3.9 fewer hours per week, the research found.

In Workforce Longer

"Raising the pension age has kept women contributing in the workforce for longer,

but the trade-off looks like a reduction in their daughters' fertility rates," said e61 Research Manager Pelin Akyol.

"This may be because women are more likely to have children when their mothers are available to help them with childcare.

"We find that grandmothers' pension eligibility has a large impact on fertility, similar to the impact of the introduction of paid parental leave, which increased the average number of births by five per cent.

The effects were even greater among women with lower wealth and education levels, suggesting they rely more on grandparental child-care.

Impacts on Fertility

"With Australia's fertility rate at a historic low of 1.5 births per woman, policymakers should carefully consider impacts on fertility when designing policies that encourage labour force participation among the older population."

The study isolated the im-

pact of pension eligibility on fertility by comparing similar women whose mothers just qualified for the pension based on their age, to those whose mothers had to keep working due to the gradual pension age increase.

The study controlled for observed and unobserved time-invariant factors, such as cohort-specific differences and year-fixed effects, as well as potentially time-varying characteristics such as education, health and region.

Hayden Has a Harness History

Life member of the Birchip Harness Racing Club, Hayden Hogan, will present the trophy to the winner of the Mallee Bull Cup at the annual harness racing meeting next Sunday, March 9.

In the mid-1960s local café owner, Joe Hogan, bought Vickie Marie. Ownership subsequently passed to Hayden Hogan and Eddie Lee. Trained and driven by Jack Caldow from Ouyen, Vickie Maree won over twenty races including three at the Melbourne Showgrounds.

This was the catalyst for growth of interest in harness racing in the Birchip district.

Hayden and Eddie both ventured into the breeding side of the industry, with Hayden standing Pacific Hanover which had early winners. Rocket Lady, his first, won at Stawell in 1974 and Bay Roan and Villa Marie ran first and second at the Hopetoun Show in 1976.

Hayden was presented with a hickory shafted sulky. However, for safety reasons this type of shaft has been discontinued.

The Track

Hayden and other prime movers including Frank Tuck,

Ken Goodwin and Pat Connelly hatched an idea to build a track at Birchip. With a major contribution from A.D. Hillgrove, work commenced on the project in 1979. A.D. had promised the track would be as good as the Moonee Valley track, but sadly A.D. passed away before it was finished.

Hayden built his stables called "Tarleton Lodge" to the East of the track in 1980. Many winners came from these stables, and many had Tarleton as the prefix to their name.

First Meetings

The first meeting at the Birchip track took place in 1982 and the inaugural Mallee Bull Cup was held in 1987, sponsored by M.J. and M.F. Foot Butchers.

It was won by Clontarf Lass, owned and trained by John and Mick Connelly and driven by Robbin Connolly.

Some other winner's were Jock Schofield's Winfield

Adios, P & J O'Connor's Truant Rajah and Hayden and G Russell's Bando Lady. Ian McCallum drove three of the six winners.

Hayden owned, bred and trained harness horses for nearly 60 years. He has also made a major contribution to the establishment and ongoing success of the club.

On Sunday, March 9, at the Mallee Bull Cup the club will acknowledge Hayden's contribution and those of his counterparts. Come along, pay tribute to Hayden, make a donation to Women Can – Team Teal (raising funds for gynaecological cancers) and enjoy a magnificent day out.

Many trainers acknowledge that Birchip's meeting is the most enjoyable race meeting they attend all year, with activities for all age groups catered for at family friendly venue that the committee manicure for the big day out.






Congratulations to all who competed, including the two Sea Lake teams and to the Tyrrell Bowling Association for its administration over the 24/25 season.
